UVLSRPC Staff Met with Congresswoman Maggie Goodlander

Three of UVLSRPC's staff had the wonderful opportunity of meeting with Congresswoman Maggie Goodlander in April. Executive Director, Meghan Butts and Regional Planner John Haffner toured Lebanon's recently reconstructed Central Fire Station along with Congresswoman Maggie Goodlander, and other city staff and elected officials. Following the tour, attendees met to discuss topics of housing, childcare, transportation, aging infrastructure, and other community priorities in Lebanon. The conversations included John explaining the Keys to the Valley project, which has identified approximately three square miles in each community that are most suitable for future housing development, including infill. The visit reinforced the importance of continued collaboration across local, state, and federal partners.



Meghan and UVLSRPC Housing Navigator, Renee Theall, were able to meet with Congresswoman Goodlander again at the Connecticut River watershed forum to discuss topics of rural regions and municipal barriers to access to federal funding, the importance of collaboration and capacity building, and how NH and VT rural farming communities are not the same as large farms in other parts of the country.

UVLSRPC staff continues to build these relationships with local, state, and federal officials as they are important to long-term regional planning. Attending important events such as these fosters collaboration with other regional partners to provide a voice for small New England communities.

UVLSRPC Data Collection

UVLSRPC offers data collection and assessments of various roadway infrastructure for towns. Assessment criteria was created in collaboration with NH Department of Transportation (**NHDOT**), UNH T2, the Regional Planning Commissions, and other State agencies. Data collected can be utilized to create long-term maintenance plans, understand forecasted improvement costs, identify priority vulnerable infrastructure, as well as be used to support grant applications.

UVLSRPC currently offers data collection and assessment for:

- Stream Crossings/Culverts
- Drainage Culverts
- Pedestrian Facilities (e.g. crosswalks, sidewalks, bike lanes)
- Pavement Road Surface Management and Maintenance Forecasting

School Chemical Safety Trainings

The Commission is working with Becky Andersen of Hazardous Materials Consulting in Iowa again for school chemical safety training. This is a great opportunity for your schools to obtain the training now required to create and implement chemical hygiene and safety plans. Becky is a talented and experienced trainer with hands-on experience working with hazardous materials in schools and industry. The feedback from previous participants included comments to bring Becky back—and that's what we're doing.

We will have several webinars to teach school staff about chemical safety basics and how to write and enforce the State-required Chemical Safety Hygiene Plans. All schools are required to have these plans to address chemical safety in all classrooms, not just the laboratory. This includes many art classrooms and custodial closets. An additional webinar will address PCBs and vapes in schools.

Green Stormwater Infrastructure Workshop with Walking Tour

The Commission is offering another workshop to discuss and view green stormwater infrastructure (GSI) options for our municipalities. The first was in Hanover and the second will be in Vermont as part of the bi-state Connecticut River Watershed stormwater project. Come learn about stormwater management at the Mount Ascutney Hospital. Our consultant, Weston & Sampson will be providing the workshop in partnership with Mount Ascutney Hospital.

They will be discussing green stormwater infrastructure (GSI): What is it? Why and when would you use it? Is it better than traditional stormwater management practices? How do you monitor and maintain GSI sites? How can towns encourage the use of GSI? The presentation and Q&A will be followed by a walking tour of the GSI structures on-site at the hospital. The event is free and open to all municipal staff and board members. This will be especially helpful for department of public works and highway personnel, select boards, and planning boards.

The workshop and walking tour at the Mount Ascutney Hospital in Windsor, VT is on May 19, 2026 from 1:00-2:30 pm.

Universal Waste & Waste Bans: Free Training for Transfer Station Operators & Solid Waste Personnel

The RPC will provide a free training and lunch on Thursday, June 4 from 10 AM to 12:30 PM at the Grantham Town Offices. Trainers will be Julie Ashton, NHDES Hazardous Waste Certification Program Leader and Tara Albert, NHDES Solid Waste Operator Training & Certification Coordinator. We will be in the meeting room accessed from the lower parking lot behind the building. Everyone is welcome with registration and lunch selection.

There will also be a discussion about the solid waste banned from landfills including wet-cell batteries, leaf & yard waste, electronic devices (updated 2024), mercury-added products, commercial/ institutional food waste (since 2025), and lithium-ion batteries (since 2025) including batteries for electric bikes, lawncare equipment, toys, and portable electronics like phones and laptops.

The training will also focus on universal waste including aerosol cans, automotive antifreeze, cathode ray tubes (CRTs) found in TVs and monitors, fluorescent lamps, and other mercury-added products such as button cell batteries, thermometers, thermostats, and tilt switches.

Tara and Julie will also provide time for an open solid waste topic Q&A discussion. Got a question? This workshop is the time to ask.

2026 Household Hazardous Waste Collection Days

UVLSRPC contracts with a hazardous waste disposal service to collect household hazardous waste from towns throughout our region. These collections happen several times in varying locations throughout the year. Many towns choose to cover the cost of disposal for their residents, so if your household is located within one of these towns listed below then the collection is free.

If you do not live in one of the listed towns, then there is a \$35 fee to dispose of up to 25 pounds or 5 gallons of waste. **ALL BUSINESSES MUST PRE-REGISTER 2 WEEKS BEFORE EVENT BY CALLING 603-448-1680 OR EMAILING TJOSEPHSON@UVLSRPC.ORG FOR A PRICE QUOTE. NO EXCEPTIONS.**

Residents with more than 5 gallons/25 pounds of household hazardous waste may be charged a fee for the excess depending on the amount of waste brought to the collection. Please call to pre-register and get a price quote if you have a large amount of HHW materials.

All payments must be cash or check made out to UVLSRPC. No credit cards are accepted at HHW events. **NO BATTERIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AT HHW COLLECTIONS THIS YEAR. THIS INCLUDES LITHIUM-ION RECHARGABLE BATTERIES. CONTACT YOUR LOCAL TRANSFER STATION FOR PROPER DISPOSAL.**

WHAT NOT TO BRING

DO NOT BRING ANY BATTERIES TO HHW COLLECTIONS

Aerosol cans, empty: Recycle with scrap metal.

Ammunition and explosives: Call State Police at 271-3636.

Asbestos: Contact a licensed asbestos specialist.

Batteries, alkaline: Most non-rechargeable batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt) are trash in NH. Tape 9-volt terminals before disposal to avoid fire in your trash

Batteries, automotive: Take to auto parts store or your transfer station

Batteries, lithium-ion and all rechargeable: Take these to your town transfer station for proper disposal.

Fire extinguishers: Recycle empty extinguishers (NRRA takes from towns)

Fluorescent lights/ballasts: May be taken at your town facility. Check with your town. Food Co-ops and Home Depot may take CFLs (spiral bulbs), not tubes

Latex paint: Use kitty litter, sawdust, or shredded paper to dry out latex paint; throw in your trash. Empty, dry metal cans may be recycled as scrap metal at your recycling facility. If it says, "clean up with soap and water," it's latex

Medical sharps: Place in a rigid container (e.g. detergent bottle), seal cap with duct tape, and label container "**SHARPS — NOT FOR RECYCLING**" Dispose of with regular trash by handing to a waste collector — **do NOT throw in trash**

Medicine: See www.twinstatesafemed.com for police stations taking meds

Propane or helium tanks: Contact town transfer station about empty tanks

Used motor oil: Take to town transfer station or a service station for recycling

NHMA and NCDE: Broadband Wi-Fi for Rural Municipalities Opportunity and Technical Support

The New Hampshire Municipal Association is collaborating with the National Collaborative for the Digital Economy (NCDE) on a broadband project to map and promote Wi-Fi for rural towns across the state using public buildings. Tens of thousands of homes and businesses have benefitted from broadband expansion through ARPA, BEAD, and IJA investments of close to \$318 million.

NCDE is looking for a minimum of 10 rural municipalities (1 per County) to launch an innovative broadband program that provides upgrades of equipment, access to devices, affordable broadband, Cyber Security strategies and a tech support team in each participating community utilizing supervised high school students.

Is your rural municipality interested in exploring how to best take advantage of additional funding aimed at helping your populations of all ages understand how to get access to government services, health care resources, and affordable broadband and devices? Does your small municipality and business districts have dead zones that if enabled, could allow for better communication in support of education and economic opportunity, with healthy outcomes in healthy communities? Do you have Wi-Fi in your Town Halls, and Libraries? If you do have Wi-Fi in your public buildings, is it secure from hackers for users of the public network?

Community Happenings

NBRC Projects In the UVLSPRC Region - Valley Regional Hospital's Workforce Housing Renovation

Valley Regional Hospital in Claremont was awarded a \$500,000 Catalyst grant from the Northern Borders Regional Commission in 2023 to renovate the historic nurses' dormitory on their grounds and convert them into 8 housing units for visiting nurses. UVLSRPC, as the Local Development District (LDD) for the region, administered the grants and worked with Valley Regional through the process. The construction finished up last fall and all the spots were immediately filled.

This project added much-needed workforce housing for traveling nurses on a short-term basis with the average stay being 1-3 months. This opens up more housing in the region for longer term tenants. This also helps to provide quality medical care for people in the Claremont area by alleviating the challenges travel nurses face when coming to our region.
